It is no easy matter, anywhere, for a man to rise when poverty stands the way of his merits: but nowhere is the effort harder than in Rome, where you must pay a big rent for a wretched lodging, a big sum to fill the bellies of your slaves, and buy a frugal dinner for yourself. You are ashamed to dine off delf; but you would see no shame in it if transported suddenly to a Marsian or Sabine table, where you would be pleased enough to wear a cape of coarse Venetian blue. - Patronage produces a hierarchical social structure
- some possibilities for upward social mobility

Paul's receipt of financial support

- General policy: maintaining financial independence
- Phoebe the deacon Romans 16:1
- she is $\pi \rho \circ \sigma \tau \dot{\alpha} \tau \iota \varsigma$ 'of many, and also of me myself'

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- feminine form of 'patron'
- hospitality at her home in Cenchrae
- not 'helper'
- cf. Jesus in Luke 8:1-3

Paul's receipt of financial support

- General policy: maintaining financial independence
- Phoebe the deacon Romans 16:1
- Paul in Corinth Acts 18:1-5

1 After this Paul left Athens and went to Corinth. 2 There he found a Jew named Aquila, a native of Pontus, who had recently come from Italy with his wife Priscilla, because Claudius had ordered all Jews to leave Rome. Paul went to see them, 3 and, because he was of the same trade, he stayed with them, and they worked togetherby trade they were tentmakers. 4 Every sabbath he would argue in the synagogue and would try to convince Jews and Greeks. 5 When Silas and Timothy arrived from Macedonia, Paul became wholly occupied in proclaiming the word, testifying to the Jews that the Messiah was Jesus. Acts 18:1-5 (NRSV adapted)



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Paul's receipt of financial support

- General policy: maintaining financial independence
- · Phoebe the deacon Romans 16:1
- Paul in Corinth Acts 18:1-5
- No outright rejection of patronage
- but Paul not entirely dependent on gifts from others
- working with his hands

- 'Paul commends Phoebe's actions so that the Roman church might act similarly towards her. She is not to be their benefactor, even as Paul is not their benefactor. Rather the goal is reciprocity.' (Lynn Cohick)
