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Exegesis: what it is and how to do it

What exegesis is

- careful reading
- seeking what the author is communicating through the text

First of all you must understand this, that no prophecy of Scripture is a matter of one's own interpretation, because no prophecy ever came by human will, but men and women moved by the Holy Spirit spoke from God.

2 Peter 1:20-21

What exegesis is

- careful reading
- seeking what the author is communicating through the text
 - in Scripture, the human author and the divine author
- how does the author present the story?
 - looking for the structure: how the story is organised
 - asking the seven key fact-finding questions

- read the section several times in more than one version (if possible)
- translation
 - are there significant problems of translation?
 - 'Give us each day our daily [epiousios] bread' Luke 11:3
 - what consequences might issues of translation have for understanding the section?

- structure: how is the text organised?
 - cause and effect
 - means to an end
 - progression to a climax or challenge
 - general statement followed by specific examples
 - the same idea expressed in different ways

- context
- form
- structure: how is the text organised?
 - look for grammar and vocabulary (word choice)
 - who does what to whom with what consequences?—verb subject and object
 - 'shift' words: but, therefore, for, because, etc.
 - use a Bible dictionary or commentary
 - use a concordance

- structure: how is the text organised?
 - look for grammar and vocabulary (word choice)
 - historical and cultural setting
 - check out customs, words, ideas which are alien to your culture or historical situation

The seven key fact-finding questions

- Who?
 - the writer or speaker
 - the readers or hearers



The seven key fact-finding questions

- Who?
 - the writer or speaker
 - the readers or hearers

their relationship

- how the writer portrays characters
 - telling and showing
 - what reaction does the writer seek?
 - empathy, sympathy, antipathy
 - or leaving it open—the older brother

The seven key fact-finding questions

- Who?
- Where?
- When?
- What?—the central event or key theme
- How?—does the writer or speaker communicate
- Why?—does it happen
- So?—what results follow

- Luke 7:18-23 flows from 7:11-17
 - Jesus raises the dead—v 22

God visiting his people

- "Blessed be the Lord God of Israel, for he has visited his people and redeemed them." Luke 1:68
- "Because of the tender mercy of our God, the dawn from on high will visit us" Luke 1:78
- "They [your enemies] will crush you [Jerusalem] to the ground, you and your children within you, and they will not leave within you one stone upon another, because you did not recognize the time of your visitation from God." Luke 19:44
