# A brief account of missio Dei

- Two factors
  - suspiscion of Christian mission because of the intertwing of colonialism and mission
  - Karl Barth's theocentric theology
- Developments
  - 1938 International Missionary Council (IMC): Karl Hartenstein
  - 1952 IMC: God's nature as Trinity entails mission
  - '...mission is not primarily an activity of the church, but an attribute of God. God is a missionary God...Mission is thereby seen as a movement from God to the world; the church is viewed as an instrument for that mission...There is church because there is mission, not vice versa.' David Bosch, *Transforming Mission*, 390
  - Late 1905s/early 1960s: God's mission claimed to be located in the world not the church
    - Restructure the church to seek and participate in God's work in the world
  - The Lausanne movement
    - Chris Wright: social transformation belongs alongside personal and spiritual conversion and transformation

### Three key elements of missio Dei (John Flett)

- Sending; cf. 2 Cor 5:20 'ambassadors for Christ'
- Orientation to the kingdom of God
- The church in its very nature is missionary
  - 'The Church on earth is by its very nature missionary since, according to the plan of the Father, it has its origin in the mission of the Son and the Holy Spirit.' (Vatican II, Ad Gentes)

#### Reading Acts on mission

- Framing the narrative Acts 1, 28
  - Acts I
    - v I continutation of Luke's Gospel
    - v 3 'concerning the kingdom of God'
    - vv 5, 8 the Spirit's power for witness, echoing Isa 43:10-12; 49:6
    - vv 14, 15-26 prayer

- Acts 28
  - v 31 Paul teaching about Jesus and the kingdom of God
  - vv 25-27 quoting Isaiah 6:9
    - 'the end of the earth' = everywhere Isa 49:6; Luke 24:47
  - v 28 'the salvation of God' for the gentiles
  - vv 30, 31 durative (ongoing action) verbs; ἀκωλύτως 'without hindrance'
- The coming of the Spirit at Pentecost Acts 2
  - The Spirit is missional: speech in other languages vv 4-11
  - Jesus is the key vv 22, 24, 32-33, 36
  - God's purpose v 23
  - The Spirit now available to all v 38; cf. vv 17-18
- The plot of the incorporation of gentiles
  - The man at the Beautiful Gate 3:1-10
  - Peter and John before the Sanhedrin 4:5-22
  - Again before the Sanhedrin 5
  - Stephen among the hellenists 6–7
  - Persecution leads to expansion 8:1b, 4
    - Philip in Samaria 8:4-24
    - Philip and the Ethiopian eunuch 8:25-40
    - The church in Syrian Antioch 11:29-36
  - Saul's Damascus road experience 9:1-20; 22:1-21; 26:2-23
  - Cornelius 10:1-11:18
  - Barnabas and Saul sent by the Spirit 13:1-4
  - Cyprus: Sergius Paulus and Bar-Jesus 13:5-15
  - Iconium: signs and wonders 14:3
  - Lystra: Paul is stoned 14:9
  - The Jerusalem meeting 15:6-29
- Other evidence
  - Paul's journey to Rome
  - The speeches of Acts
- Are believers just 'twitching puppets' (Ernst Haenchen)?
  - The church slow to recognise God's work 11:2: 15:2-3, 5
  - John Miller on 16:6-10

# Acts and missio Dei

- Is mission 'sending'?
  - Yes: 3:26; 2:1-4; 9:17; 13:1-4
  - No: no 'call' to mission; no 'sending' scene Luke 24:46-47; Acts 1:8
- Kingdom orientation
- The church as missionary
- Eschatology 3:21

# Three illustrative implications

- Recognise the breadth of what God does
- Focus on seeking God and his ways
- Be open to the surprises of God
